Easter Sings Hope's Reprise

"Hope" is the thing with feathers -

That perches in the soul -

And sings the tune without the words—And never stops all (Emily Dickinson)

But from where does this feathered hope migrate and perch in the soul? Who put it there? Who taught it to sing – this unceasing tune without words?

It comes from over the horizon, beyond our sight. It travels from the lands that we cannot see, down where the sun settles at night, as it prepares to push back the darkness. This enfeathered hope is conceived by the breath of dawn.


The tune it sings requires no words, for hope is cheapened by rambling trivialities and scandalous sureties. "We have no words," they often say when grief steals all meaning. But hope, like grief, its twin, is wordless too because it cannot be contained or captured, or held by a thought, or commanded to appear. Hope arrives - singing! - singing an unceasing tune - familiar - for it has been here all along.

Easter goes by another name. Easter sings hope's reprise: that "thing with feathers - That perches in the soul - And sings the tune without the words - And never stops - at all." For the Easter song travels from over the horizon, from beyond our

sight, from the lands that we cannot see, down where the sun settles at night, as it prepares to push back We are not alone in our pain and sufferthe darkness.

On Easter morn, we cannot help but at join this wordless song. Hope, that is uncontainable, that sings unceasingly, that travels from the darkness bearing light, that journeys from the place of sleep to awaken life, that perches in our soul – this Easter promise is the still-point and purpose of everything. Easter's real name is "hope". And hope too is known by another and truer name: Christ Jesus - the light, the song, the beginning, the end, the new creation, the undeserved gift, the glorious, abiding Divine harmony, that perches in the soul and sings - and sings, and never stops - at all. ing, God is with us. The debates around Voluntary Assisted Dying (VAD) have featured in both the media and discussions for many years.

The VAD laws have now been passed in Queensland and are operative. Not surprisingly, much of the debate centred on the aspect of people dying with pain. Some would say that they don't want a painful death for themselves or their loved one. Despite the reassurances that palliative care is sophisticated and compassionate, the "I don't want pain" debate won out in the long run. When we gaze upon the crucified one through the liturgies of Easter, we see that there was no escaping pain for Jesus. Not even his status as Son of God helped remove his sufferings. We are consoled when we contemplate that God in Christ intimately knows pain and death.

God knows what it is like! For God's love for every human person has proved to be so strong that God would not walk away from what we face in life.

God does not want us to suffer, yet we know we face its impact in many and various ways. Pain comes across the bow of our lives regularly but, for us, the only way we can look at these times is through the eyes of faith.

Easter is the bright light that shines right into the crevices of all our pain and suffering, reassuring us that we are not alone, that God has been there and is still there with us.

May this radiance of the Risen Christ enlighten our hearts this Eastertide and bring whatever is painful in life to a new awareness. May

hope in the One who conquered pain and death bless us with Easter Joy.
