Fr Peter's Message

Exercising the Spirit

January is certainly the month for those interested in keeping fit, with our parks and footpaths full of good-intentioned people compensating for some over indulging at Christmas and New Year. Keeping body and mind fit and healthy is certainly an excellent way of maintaining a positive and energetic approach to the working year and its' uncertain events and opportunities. Are any of your New Year intentions connected to your faith life and our relationship with God or are they simply to do with creature habits that could do with some attention?

If only we applied some of the same care to our spiritual life as we do to our physical life, we really could call ourselves complete people, fully alive. Like all wellbeing, our faith requires discipline and exercise, but for many people, the tasks they set themselves, while well intentioned, are often short-lived and ill prepared.

Keeping ourselves energised spiritually is not simply about "going to Church", which can be an excellent way of feeding our spiritual hunger, but can become mundane and repetitive, if we don't prepare our souls to receive what prayer and the sacraments really offer.

Some preparatory exercises can be as simple as making a list of the people and issues we pray for and asking ourselves why are these people and concerns important to us. Perhaps a hand written note (emails have become too easy and impersonal) to distant family or friends who may be on the "we only see them at weddings and funerals" list. The donation of the cost of a weekly home cooked meal, say \$5, to a charity or worthwhile cause, and then going without that meal as a reminder of our authority to bring about some change in the lives of others. Taking the initiative to greet the stranger, rather than waiting for others to speak to us first.

When prayer gets a little stale or uninspired, then reading the insights of spiritual writers or theologians can head us in exciting and challenging directions, yet undiscovered in our own spiritual journey. Reading and learning about the sacraments and their rich meaning can prepare us to see treasures where we previously saw a bland space. Learning and understanding our faith is not simply something we do at school, and then hope that that should be sufficient to carry us through our life's experiences.

There are hundreds of different ways to shake up and wake up a tired and unmotivated faith life, but they all involve strong intention and a readiness to turn that intention into action. No one gets fit by thinking or talking about exercise. They get up and do it. This is an excellent time for us to start acting on our beliefs not just talking about how some day we must really get into it.

The Epiphany Blessing

Marking Homes with Blessed Chalk for the New Year.

The ancient custom of marking the door of the home with blessed chalk is a way of incorporating the liturgical feast of the Epiphany as a domestic ritual into the prayer life of the family. Chalk is first blessed in the parish church as Masses for Epiphany and then people are invited to take some home and to mark the lintel of their front door as follows:

20 C+M+B 24

The letters C, M and B stand for the traditional names for the Three Wise Men who come seeking Jesus: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. The letters also represent the words *Christus Mansionem Benedict (May Christ bless this Abode)*.

FIRST READING: 1 Samuel 3:3-10, 19

Samuel was lying in the sanctuary of the Lord where the ark of God was, when the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' He answered, 'Here I am'. Then he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli said, 'I did not call. Go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' He replied, 'I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down.' Samuel had as yet no knowledge of the Lord and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. Once again the Lord called, the third time. He got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli then understood that it was the Lord who was calling the boy, and he said to Samuel, 'Go and lie down, and if someone calls say, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

The Lord then came and stood by, calling as he had done before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel answered, 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.'

Samuel grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 6:13-15. 17-20

The body is not meant for fornication; it is for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. God, who raised the Lord from the dead, will by his power raise us up too.

You know, surely, that your bodies are members making up the body of Christ; anyone who is joined to the Lord is one spirit with him.

Keep away from fornication. All the other sins are committed outside the body; but to fornicate is to sin against your own body. Your body, you know, is the temple of the Holy Spirit, which is in you since you have received him from God. You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for. That is why you should use your body for the glory of God.

GOSPEL: John 1:35-42

They saw where Jesus lived and they stayed with him.

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God.' Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, 'What do you want?' They answered, 'Rabbi,' — which means Teacher — 'where do you live?' 'Come and see' he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour.

One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' – which means the Christ – and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas' – meaning Rock.
