Fr Peter's Message

Health of Body and Soul

With all the uncertainty around the Covid19 epidemic, it's easy for us to fall into panic mode, whereas what is needed at the moment is a clear head and a positive outlook. Because most of us fear what we do not know, we tend to fill in the gaps with the worst case scenario, particularly when it comes to things medical. Having dealt with a few health issues over the past 5 years as well as coping with the questions of which advice I should follow. I have recently become interested in some natural remedies and a little bit of "mind over matter". The common recommendation of less stress and more rest, reminded me of an article I read on the internet, which said that attitudes of forgiveness, optimism, happiness and perseverance can actually lower stress, reduce risk of heart disease, high blood pressure and infection. Equally a steady state of worry, hostility, hopelessness, grief and depression increases the risk of infection, inflammatory conditions, and can slow recovery from sickness. In other words, a positive mind-set is as important to good health as exercise and diet. Easy for me to say, but how do we stay positive when there are so many things to worry about? The following simple suggestions might help tip your mental scales toward the positive side of life and cut down on trips to the doctor.

Smile: Smiling is free- but its benefits are priceless. Apparently doing so lowers stress hormones in the brain, and may power up the body's immune system.

Express Gratitude: People who express gratitude tend to live longer, healthier lives. Mentally rehearsing or writing a list of daily blessings is a powerful buffer against depression.

Forgive: Harbouring anger or grudges increases our blood pressure. An act may not be excusable, but it is forgivable. Forgiving allows you to let the injury go. The healing spirit of forgiveness is a gift that God bestows to all who ask.

Don't Give Up: Successful people are not mistake-free, they just refuse to give up. Be inspired by the success of others and learn from criticism. Building a more resilient, wholesome attitude will put the oil of enthusiasm back into the mechanics of everyday life.

Help Others: Offer to help someone in some way. It takes less than a few seconds to open a door for someone, but the effects of this kindness last a lot longer for you and for them. Taking your mind off your problems for a while can be a pleasant distraction.

Pray: It is now clinically proven that people who pray have a noticeable

These are just a couple of non-medicinal suggestions, which, although they make sense, are sometimes quite hard to administer. It is often just too convenient to take a pill or swallow a potion. As with all ailments, if symptoms persist see your doctor, but sometimes the spiritual remedy may be the best medicine.

Chronic worry, anxiety and fear are the opposite of trust. Trust in God is the most potent weapon against mental and physical problems. "Trust in God at all times, you people; pour out your heart before Him; God is a refuge for us" Psalm 26: 8

Let us pray that the Spirit helps us recognise the gift of different charisms within the Christian communities, and to discover the richness of different ritual traditions within the Catholic Church





The Order of the Mass

GLORIA (when spoken)

with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father.

FIRST READING:

Amen.

Deuteronomy 18:15-20

Moses said to the people: 'Your God will raise up for you a prophet like myself, from among yourselves, from your own brothers; to him you must listen. This is what you yourselves asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the Assembly. "Do not let me hear again" you said "the voice of the Lord my God, nor look any longer on this great fire, or I shall die"; and the Lord said to me, "All they have spoken is well said. I will raise up a prophet like yourself for them from their own brothers; I will put my words into his mouth and he shall tell them all I command him. The man who does not listen to my words that he speaks in my name, shall be held answerable to me for it. But the prophet who presumes to say in my name a thing I have not commanded him to say, or who speaks in the name of other gods, that prophet shall die."

RESPONSORIAL PSALM:

Psalm 94:1-2, 6-9

(R.) If today, you hear his voice, harden not your hearts.



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SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 7:32-35

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

GOSPEL: Mark 1:21-28

This is a new kind of teaching that speaks with authority.

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.

AUSTRALIA DAY MESSAGE

Australia Day is marked in different ways by the different peoples who form the rich tapestry of this nation lying beneath the Southern Cross.

For some it is a moment to look back with pride on the many achievements of Australia since 26 January 1788. What began as a penal colony became in a relatively short time a peaceful and prosperous nation. It also became a stable democracy, sealed by Federation. None of this was easy, and Australia Day can be a time to give thanks for the sacrifices made.

For others who have come to this land more recently, often escaping the horrors of war, persecution and poverty, it is a moment to give thanks for the new home they have found in this country where they have been able to recover hope and rebuild their lives. Australia has given them much, but they too have given Australia much; and for that we all give thanks on the national day.

For the first inhabitants of the land Australia Day looks different. We cannot forget the injustice and dispossession they have known since 1788. Often they were displaced from their land; and Australia has slowly come to understand that to break the bond between Aboriginal peoples and the land was to do them great violence, communally and individually. The cornerstone of Aboriginal cultures was shaken, with devastating consequences for Aboriginal peoples' sense of identity. This was made worse when children were removed from their families. To this day, we see the effects of this, described at times as intergenerational trauma.

We who are not culpable are nonetheless responsible to do what we can to heal the wounds of injustice, since until those wounds are healed the claim that "all are equal" in this land will be little more than empty words. From 1788 until now, all have not been equal here; and they never will be until we remember in a way that reckons truthfully with the past and commits to doing what is necessary to heal the wounds. Until they are healed our national potential will never be fully realised, and Australia Day will not be the time of shared celebration it is meant to be.

A national day can be for us all a moment of deeper reflection when we recognise that Australia, with its many peoples, is capable of great compassion and of a wisdom that understands the truth. It can be a day to recognise what this country can be, a land where all are in fact equal and can walk together into the future God is preparing.
